Traditional Advent services in the Anglican church vividly and poignantly prepared worshipers for the coming of the Lord Jesus Christ. Much of our program draws from these ancient liturgies, yet we soon discover that new carols connect us to the faithful past by echoing the same messages of hope and expectation. Time and again, people have recrafted familiar words and melodies in new ways to speak of their own experience of a life apart from God; his loving forgiveness; and their hope for his merciful dealings with all the world. This Advent service gives voice to the longing of God's people through the ages as they look for his living and working in their lives. We, therefore, join together for this ceremonial Service of Lessons and Carols, expectantly awaiting God's presence among us.

With the birth of a child born in obscurity while the rest of the world was asleep, God offers us restoration from brokenness to wholeness, and the remarkable gift of continuously transformed lives. Christ brings peace, light, and hope into the black despair which threatens to overwhelm our world. In this service, as in all the Advent season, we recognize the world's desperate need of Christ, recall his coming to save it, and refocus our gaze on his coming again in judgment to make it wholly his at last.



FIRST LESSON

Adam and Eve rebel against God and are cast out of the Garden of Eden. Genesis 3:1-15, 17-19

Now the serpent was more crafty than any other wild animal that the Lord God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God say, 'You shall not eat from any tree in the garden?" The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; but God said, 'You shall not eat of the fruit of the tree that is in the middle of the garden, nor shall you touch it, or you shall die." But the serpent said to the woman, "You will not die; for God knows that when you eat of it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." Then the eyes of both were opened, and they knew that they were naked; and they sewed fig leaves together and made loincloths for themselves.

They heard the sound of the Lord God walking in the garden at the time of the evening breeze, and the man and his wife hid themselves from the presence of the Lord God among the trees of the garden. But the Lord God called to the man, and said to him, "Where are you?" He said, "I heard the sound of you in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked; and I hid myself." He said, "Who told you that you were naked? Have you eaten from the tree of which I commanded you not to eat?" The man said, "The woman whom you gave to be with me, she gave me fruit from the tree, and I ate." Then the Lord God said to the woman, "What is this that you have done?" The woman said, "The serpent tricked me, and I ate."



FIFTH LESSON

You are not in darkness, for you are children of the light. 1 Thessalonians 5:1-11, 23, 24, 28

Now concerning the times and the seasons, brothers and sisters, you do not need to have anything written to you. For you yourselves know very well that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night. When they say, "There is peace and security," then sudden destruction will come upon them, as labor pains come upon a pregnant woman, and there will be no escape! But you, beloved, are not in darkness, for that day to surprise you like a thief; for you are all children of light and children of the day; we are not of the night or of darkness. So then let us not fall asleep as others do, but let us keep awake and be sober; for those who sleep sleep at night, and those who are drunk get drunk at night. Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing.

May the God of peace himself sanctify you entirely; and may your spirit and soul and body be kept sound and blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. The one who calls you is faithful, and he will do this.

SEVENTH LESSON

The Seer sees the New Jerusalem and hears the church's plea for her Lord's return. Revelation 21:1-4, 22:1-5, 12-13, 16-17, 20

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth; for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away, and the sea was no more. And I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem, coming down out of heaven from God, prepared as a bride adorned for her husband. And I heard a loud voice from the throne saying,

"See, the home of God is among mortals. He will dwell with them; they will be his people, and God himself will be with them; he will wipe every tear from their eyes. Death will be no more; mourning and crying and pain will be no more, for the first things have passed away."


